Applying the Science from Josh Eyler's How Humans Learn

Follow-up on Josh Eyler's August keynote by applying information from his book *How Humans Learn* to your teaching practice. *How Humans Learn* is divided into five categories: curiosity, sociality, emotion, authenticity, and failure. The CETL Faculty Advisory Committee is developing a **menu of options** for faculty to engage with one or more sections of the book. Options will include participating in on-campus or virtual discussions, joining Josh Eyler for a follow-up conversation, reflective writing, and more. IDEA Survey Changes

If you haven't yet heard about TILT or transparent assignment design, check out www.tilthighered.com. By making assignments more "transparent," faculty can help demystify college-level work. Students who receive more transparent assignments have an increased sense of belonging and academic confidence. Both characteristics are associated with improved academic performance. Use of transparent assignments can also increase the retention rate for incoming sophomores.
